Welcome Address by Mr Foo Seng Juan, President Food, Drinks And Allied Workers Union

Dr Tan Eng Liang, Sr Minister of State (Finance), Distinguished Guests, Participants, Ladies and Gentlemen:

On behalf of the members of the Executive Council of the Union and on my own behalf, allow me to extend to all of you a most hearty and warm welcome to this Seminar. This Seminar is organised with the cooperation of NTUC as a follow-up to the NTUC Seminar on "The Next Ten Years - Job Creation or Job Loss" held in October last year. On the other hand, it is also the responsibility of the management too, to formulate a training scheme and pursue policies to upgrade the skill of the workers.

with regard to the workshop sessions, I would like to invite your attention to two aspects, which, I presume will be discussed during the workshop. In this workshop, I would like you to focus on the scope and role of FDAWU relating to the development of the Hotel industry which it is responsible for.

This Seminar is organised mainly as a channel to create an awareness of each and every person to the future economic situation in Singapore. In 1969, the Seminar on "Modernisation of the Labour Movement" created a new modern role of the labour movement in the new political, social and economic situation.

I hope this FDAWU Seminar can also lead the Union to a new phase of its development.

Many of your colleagues are anxious to share what you have learned. I believe, that only through an effective follow-up Seminar and workshops at the grass-root level will the results of the NTUC Seminar have a mutiple effect. I hope therefore that this Seminar will benefit you greatly.
