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SPEECH BY MR MOHAMAD MAIDIN PACKER MOHD, PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARY FOR EDUCATION AT THE OPENING CEREMONY OF INFOCOMMUNICATION CAREER SEMINAR 1999 AT THE

Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen.

We need to develop capabilities of knowledge, skills and creativity in our people. This will help to develop a nation of enterprising and innovative citizens with the capacity to anticipate and overcome the challenges that a knowledge-based economy will bring.

3. The development of the info-communications industry is critical to the building of this knowledge-based economy. Already, the exponential growths of the Internet and its technologies have changed the way we live, work and play. At today's Career Seminar, you will get to hear more about the importance of IT in the new global economic order. You will also be treated to a variety of exciting and challenging career opportunities that await you when you are ready to enter the job market.

4. We all aspire to careers that will allow us to express our talents, fire our interests, and at the same time fulfill the needs of the nation. Changes in society, technology and the wider world mean that career opportunities are evolving all the time. You therefore need to keep abreast of what is available and what will be in demand when you enter the job market.

5. But there is a time lag between now and your entry into the working world. During this time, you will need to increasingly prepare yourself for the world of work. What subjects and courses you decide to take will depend very much on which the careers you would ultimately like to pursue. The greater the specialization of a course of study, the more difficult and expensive it is to make changes midway. The non-monetary costs, in terms of time and motivation, will be felt not just by you and your family, but by the nation as well.

6. So you will need to choose carefully. Schools have instituted career guidance programmes to assist you in making wise choices from a base of accurate and relevant knowledge. This Career Seminar is yet another avenue for you to acquire knowledge about one of the most dynamic and developing industries in Singapore. I am heartened by your presence here today even though it is the school holidays.

7. This afternoon, the Organising Committee has brought together some experts in the diverse field of info-communications to share their knowledge and experiences with you. I am confident that you will find the rest of the Seminar informative and beneficial.

In conclusion, I would like to express my appreciation to the Organising Committee, comprising representatives from the Ministry of Education, Telecommunication Authority of Singapore, Singapore Exhibition Services and the various polytechnics and universities, for their efforts in putting together this event. It now gives me great pleasure to declare the Info-communications Career Seminar '99 open.
