Good afternoon.

- 1 Thank you for inviting me to join you today at the Tote

 Board Enabling Lives Initiative Grant Award and

 Networking 2016. I Childes of Singapore
 - 2 The Tote Board Enabling Lives Initiative is a very meaningful initiative that aims to improve the quality of lives of persons with disabilities and their caregivers.

This initiative sees Tote Board as a strategic funder in supporting social innovation projects that address crosscutting disability issues.

3 As a Grant Management partner, SG Enable has reached out to more than 70 organisations through its various grant calls. I understand that to date, \$7million out of the \$23million in grant money has been committed for various projects to benefit persons with disabilities and their caregivers. Later this afternoon, we will see 2 new grant calls on Accessibility and Mobility, and Transition to Work, which will see the support of more worthy projects.

4 As we saw in the video earlier, caregivers such as Angie and Jothi have benefited from caregiver programmes that are supported by this Grant.

The other projects focusing on data and technology and transition management will also see persons with disabilities having greater access to information, support and innovations that can enable them to improve their quality of life and live more independently.

5 This Grant also aims to spur collaboration across different sectors, such as amongst voluntary welfare organisations, social enterprises, and research and higher learning institutes. SG Enable does not just match partners together through networking sessions and joint applications for the grant, but they also actively create platforms to promote the sharing of good practices and learning in social innovations.

6 To this end, SG Enable has created a dedicated website for the Grant which will feature resources and toolkits, social innovation communities, and collaborative platforms for everyone to contribute their ideas and learn from one and another. I hope that all of you can participate actively and use this site to build an active community of like-minded organisations and individuals. Together, we can make meaningful impact on the lives of persons with disabilities and their caregivers.

7 Tote Board and SG Enable have also jointly embarked on developing an Impact Measurement Framework with the Institute of System Science (ISS) from the National University of Singapore. ISS will be sharing more about this framework later.

It is my hope that Tote Board and SG Enable can take the lead to demonstrate how we can move towards more evidence-based practices in the social service sector and develop more effective funding models that can achieve greater collective impact.
