Companies today are encouraged to offer more flexible work arrangements to help parents achieve work-life balance. Keeping the family strong is an important aspect of the Government's thrust towards a stronger society.

Women are also taking on leadership roles in both the corporate and community organisations. As a woman, this trend is heartening to me. Women bring a different perspective and important skills to any organisation. I am certain that the diversity in corporate and community

leadership is mutually beneficial to both the organisation and the individual.
