## OFFICAL LAUNCH OF OFFICE FOR SPACE TECHNOLOGY AND INDUSTRY (OSTIn)

### Whole-of-government approach reflects Government's commitment to capture economic opportunities and build a thriving space industry in Singapore

- 1. To capture economic opportunities and build a thriving space industry for Singapore, the Singapore Economic Development Board (EDB), together with other participating ministries and agencies<sup>1</sup>, have established the Office for Space Technology and Industry (OSTIn). This was announced by the Second Minister for Trade & Industry, Mr S Iswaran, at the 5<sup>th</sup> Global Space Technology Convention (GSTC) today.
- 2. Set up as a programme office under the Singapore Economic Development Board, OSTIn will serve as the designated office to plan and execute economic strategies to grow Singapore's space industry. This includes working with satellite industry players to realize their business and innovation initiatives from Singapore. OSTIn will also develop relevant research capabilities and talent pool to support the sustainable growth of Singapore's satellite industry. In addition, OSTIn will forge collaborations with governments, space agencies and organizations to embark on initiatives that will lead to economic benefits for all parties involved.
- The global space economy grew to US\$ 290 billion in 2011, reflecting a robust 3. single-year expansion of 12.2 per cent.<sup>2</sup> This was largely driven by the growth of the satellite industry, which grew at an annual rate of 10.9 per cent since 2006 to reach US\$ 177 billion.<sup>3</sup>

- 4. "The Asian satellite industry is poised for growth. The rising affluence of the Asian consumer and increased usage of sophisticated satellite technologies by businesses are fuelling the demand for satellite services in the region," said Mr Gian Yi-Hsen, Director OSTIn. "Companies looking to design and manufacture small satellites, as well as expand their downstream services, can leverage Singapore's political neutrality, existing technical capabilities and business friendly environment to capitalise on the growth of the satellite industry in Asia."
- 5. The satellite industry will create a variety of jobs within the sector itself as well as across many industries including transport engineering, precision engineering, electronics and infocommunications.
- 6. "As the Singapore workforce becomes progressively better qualified and better educated, there is a corresponding need to create good, high paying jobs that meet the aspirations of Singaporeans," added Mr Gian. "The growth of Singapore's space industry will also result in the creation of good job opportunities for PMETS<sup>4</sup>. It will provide employment for a wide range of professionals including physicists, mathematicians, machinists, electrical and mechanical engineers, IT and software systems experts, as well as business development managers."
