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SPEECH BY MR HOWE YOON CHONG, MINISTER OF DEFENCE AND MP FOR POTONG PASIR, AT THE BABY SHOW PRIZE-GIVING CEREMONY AT THE SEMBERT COMMUNITY CENTRE, ON SUNDAY, JUNE 22, 1980, AT 11 A.M.
