SPEECH BY TAN ENG LIANG, CHAIRMAN, SINGAPORE SPORTS COUNCIL, AT THE MCDONALD'S RESTAURANTS CHEQUE PRESENTATION TO THE SPORTS AID FUND AT THE NATIONAL STADIUM THEATRETTE ON FRI 20 MAY 83 AT 10.00 AM

In the short time since the establishment of the Sports
Aid Fund, one feature has emerged that is worthy of mention.

Individuals with a few dollars to spare have come forward to donate with the same alacrity and sincerity as corporations with their donations of thousands of dollars. This spontaneity, coupled with the spirit of giving and abiding concern for the betterment of sports in Singapore, speaks well of our contributors, big and small.

I salute them all for their generosity.

This morning it is my duty and pleasure to acknowledge with thanks the magnanimous support given by McDonald's Restaurants to the development of sports excellence in general and to Ang Peng Siong, Junie Sng, Mavis Ee and others. Their \$64,000 donation drives home one message: that any sportsman or woman of calibre and potential, genuinely deserving of help need not harbour any fear of the lack of support from well-wishers.
